## SPEAKER DETAILS

Mike Press is Professor of Design Policy at the Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art and Design at the University of Dundee. With research interests that span design and the applied arts, Mike has directed research projects for the UK Design Council and the Crafts Council, and has a track record in undertaking work that addresses issues of regional and national policy within the field of design. In 1999, he was Co-Director of the original Design Against Crime project, funded by the Home Office, the Department of Trade and Industry and the Design Council. He has published and broadcast internationally, and is co-author with Professor Rachel Cooper of 'The Design Agenda' and 'The Design Experience', both now standard texts in design management.

James Powell OBE is a leading academic in the fields of engineering research and education and science. His personal interests over the last 30 years have been concerned with improving the relationship between industry and academia for their mutual benefit. Originally a Chartered European Engineer, James joined academia to develop his chosen disciplines of technology, simultaneous engineering and creative team building. Formerly Director of Academic Enterprise (AE) James created the University of Salford's unique attempt to form meaningful, wealth creating and socially inclusive partnerships with industry, business, the civil and voluntary services and the community at large. He has published over 140 refereed academic papers, 13 books and has received over £22 million of financial support for his research, developments and information transfer studies. He has an international network of over 30 design and action learning researchers who are brought together to tackle major projects. On the 15th June 1996, in the Queen's Birthday Honours list, James was awarded the OBE for 'services to science and to engineering/research and education.'

Armando has co-authored many articles for European journals on Safety by Design and CPTED. Since 1995, he has delivered several presentations in the Netherlands and Europe, including: E-DOCA & DOCA-UK European seminar in Barcelona, Spain (2002); COPS in Athens, Greece (2004); Police Academy Münster, Germany (2004); Central St. Martins College of Art and Design in London, UK (2005); Home Office in Germany (2006); Madrid, Spain (2007); and Zurich, Switzerland (2008).

After completing a postgraduate course in sociology at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Vienna, Günter spent seven months as a postgraduate research fellow in the Department of Criminology at Keele University,UK, where he specialised in the field of crime prevention and social control. Returning to Vienna, he completed his PhD in social science from the University of Vienna. Since then Günter has worked as Research Assistant at the

Department of Sociology at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Vienna, and between 2005 and 2008, as a professional researcher at the Institute for the Sociology of Law and Criminology (IRKS). He teaches qualitative research methods to social work students at the University of Applied Science in St. Pölten, Austria, and most recently at the Danube-University Krems, Austria, as part of their professional training in security management. Günter is currently a European Research Fellow at the Centre for Criminological Research at Keele University, UK, where he leads an EU-funded research project on the political conditions and practical implications for the standardisation of CPTED principles in Europe. Paul is a Visiting Professor to the Adelphi Research Institute at the University of Salford (UK) .
